Dowry-related violence remains one of the most persistent forms of gender-based violence in India despite the presence of legal safeguards and growing social awareness. Dowry deaths, in particular, represent an extreme manifestation of domestic violence where married women are subjected to harassment, cruelty and in some cases fatal violence due to dowry demands. To address this social evil, the Indian legal system has introduced several provisions, including the Dowry Prohibition Act and the penal provision of Indian Penal Code Section 304B, which specifically criminalizes deaths associated with dowry harassment. However, the continued reporting of such cases indicates a significant gap between legal protection and social reality.

Despite these legal safeguards, dowry deaths remain a persistent social problem, raising questions about the effectiveness of existing laws and their implementation. According to reports published by the National Crime Records Bureau, thousands of dowry death cases are recorded annually across India, indicating that legal prohibition alone has not been sufficient to eradicate the practice. The continued occurrence of such cases underscores the complex interaction between legal frameworks and socio-cultural factors such as patriarchy, economic pressures and societal expectations surrounding marriage. In this context, a socio-legal analysis becomes essential to understand both the legal mechanisms addressing dowry deaths and the social conditions that sustain them. This study aims to examine the trends in dowry death cases in India from 2005 to 2023 using secondary data sources. Several studies using crime statistics from the National Crime Records Bureau have identified dowry deaths as one of the most severe forms of violence against married women in India. Researchers have consistently observed that dowry deaths occur predominantly within the early years of marriage and are often associated with harassment and cruelty by husbands or in-laws. These studies suggest that while legal provisions such as the Dowry Prohibition Act and Indian Penal Code Section 304B exist, the implementation and conviction rates remain relatively low due to social pressures, lack of evidence and delays in the judicial process.

Recent analyses of crime data indicate that dowry-related crimes continue to remain a significant concern in India. According to recent NCRB statistics, more than 15,000 dowry-related cases were registered in 2023 and over 6,100 women lost their lives due to dowry-related violence, demonstrating the continued prevalence of the problem despite legal measures aimed at preventing it.

Sociological studies further highlight the structural roots of dowry practices in patriarchal family systems, gender inequality and socio-economic pressures associated with marriage. Scholars argue that dowry is often viewed as a symbol of social status and economic security, which leads families to continue the practice even when it is legally prohibited. As a result, the gap between legal prohibition and social practice continues to sustain dowry-related violence.

Overall, the existing literature suggests that dowry deaths are not merely criminal incidents but are deeply embedded in social structures and cultural norms. While previous research has provided valuable insights into the causes and patterns of dowry violence, there remains a need for updated trend-based studies using recent statistical data. Therefore, the present study attempts to examine the socio-legal trends in dowry death cases in India over the last decade through an analysis of secondary data sources.
