Reports published by the National Human Rights Commission (NHRC) have consistently emphasized that communal violence results in serious violations of fundamental human rights, including the rights to life, equality, dignity, and freedom of religion. These reports underscore the importance of prompt investigation, victim rehabilitation, and institutional accountability. Several legal scholars have analyzed the constitutional dimensions of communal violence, particularly in relation to Articles 14, 15, 21, and 25 of the Constitution of India. Their studies highlight the obligation of the State to protect citizens from discrimination and violence. Judicial decisions concerning major incidents of communal violence have also been examined to assess the effectiveness of legal remedies and state responsibility.
